1 · YOUR PLANNED TREATMENT

Item	Information
Patient	DEMO PATIENT A (fictitious)
Planned procedure	Q-LASIK — both eyes, same day
Why you were found suitable	Your eye measurements (thickness, shape, numbers) were checked one by one and passed every safety limit. Because your cornea is on the thin side, a thinner tissue layer was planned — the safer choice for you.
Surgery day	to be given with your appointment — do not drive that morning; bring a companion

2 · THE RULES YOU MUST FOLLOW

Rule	Duration / detail
Do NOT rub your eyes	especially in the first weeks — rubbing can shift the new tissue layer
Keep water out	keep shower water out for 1 week; pools/sea off-limits for 2-4 weeks
Your drop schedule	use every drop ON time and for the FULL course — stopping early harms healing
Bandage lens	you may have a protective lens — never insert or remove it yourself; your doctor will
Make-up	no eye make-up for 1 week

3 · THE RISKS — IN PLAIN LANGUAGE

Every operation carries risks. The ones discussed for you: a chance of seeing rings around lights at night (your pupil is slightly larger than average — your doctor discussed this with you) · temporary dryness and stinging · rarely, part of the prescription returning (a touch-up is possible if needed; tissue reserve was kept for it) · very rarely, infection (following the drop rules keeps this small). Your doctor explained what each risk means for your own eyes at the examination.

4 · CHECK-UP SCHEDULE & EMERGENCIES

When	What happens
Day 1 · week 1 · month 1	routine checks — do not skip



When	What happens
Call IMMEDIATELY	sudden pain · sudden drop in vision · growing redness · heavy discharge — if any of these appear, do not wait for the next visit
